

CHAIR(WO)MAN of the BOARD

Catholic Charities is excited to welcome Karen Church, CEO of Elga Credit Union, as its newest Board Chair. She is a leader and believer and truly stands behind the credit union's motto of "People Helping People".

Karen takes pride in developing new leaders, mentoring, coaching, and leading by example. She devotes countless hours of volunteer time to support community events each year. She may stand little more than five feet tall, but she has the heart of a giant! If there is a good cause in Flint, you can be sure she's there; running the 5k race to create awareness, handing out donations to those in need and raising her paddle to support the latest fundraiser.

She and her husband, Duane, even established a charitable fund, providing grants to support literacy programs, initiatives and organizations in Genesee County. They have also designated Catholic Charities for a Legacy Gift.

"I have always known it's important to give back. My husband and I both come from large entrepreneurial families who taught us that the more you give, the more you receive. There's such joy in seeing how your contribution has helped someone else," says Karen.

Catholic Charities is close to her heart for many reasons. "The scope of services the agency provides is unequaled in Genesee County, and I want to be a part of an organization that works so tirelessly to help others," she says.

But she also has a very personal connection to Catholic Charities. Between 2016 and 2018 Karen's son Chad, and his wife Christina had multiple miscarriages while trying to start a family. They were beginning to lose hope that they would ever have a family because they believed adoption was financially out of their reach. What they didn't know was that Michigan has a Safe Delivery law which allows parents to safely and legally surrender their newborn, to a uniformed employee who is inside and on duty at any hospital, fire department, police station, or by calling 9-1-1.


Catholic Charities Adoption program was the answer to their prayers. Sometimes it can take a long time to receive a child through the Safe Delivery law and you have to be ready at a moment's notice to become parents. Karen's grandson Wyatt was born on June 21, 2018. Overnight she became a grandmother to a little boy in need of love, and there are no words to describe the joy he has brought to Karen and her family.

Karen's energy is uncontainable, and she takes on her new roll as Board Chair with enthusiasm, saying, "I look forward to learning more about the agencies in Flint and how we can collaborate to serve the community in the best possible way."

Karen joined ELGA Credit Union in 1978 and has served in the role of CEO since 1993. She has been a Michigan Credit Union League Board Member since 2009, where she currently serves as treasurer. Karen's community affiliations include Community Foundation, Women and Girls Advisory Council, Zonta, and the Literacy Network. Karen is a member of St. Francis Xavier Church, Otisville, where she serves as chairperson of the finance committee

ave you ever heard the phrase, "be in the world but not of the world" uttered as if it's some sort of programmed response for the definition of discipleship? Have you felt yourself nodding, expressing complete agreement: "Of course, live in this world but not be of it."


But then moments later, the ambiguity of the statement begins to sink in. Thoughts like, "What does it even mean?" and, "Can this seemingly abstract concept apply to my life in a concrete way?" begin to swirl around in your mind? If this has happened to you, you're not alone. Believers around the world struggle with the notion of discipleship. Living your faith takes contemplation and intention. It's very easy to feel alone on this journey.

But a group of parishioners from Owosso may have cracked the code. It started in 2013 when Deacon Ralph Poyo came to speak at St. Paul's in Owosso. The Deacon, founder of New Evangelization Ministries, challenged participants to take a cold hard look at how they express their faith outside of Sunday Mass.

"It was probably one of the more jarring talks that I had ever listened to as a Catholic. He was directly challenging us to live our faith with the higher level of discipleship. I had a real emotional struggle with that mission because I felt I wasn't living it," said George Welte.

In a busy world, we make choices as to which activity, passion, or pursuit we'll

entertain with

our attention. In the midst of this, we often push our faith to the margins of our life—to become something we do on the side, when we're not focusing on our career or taking care of our family. As a bi-product of that mission series, St. Paul's formed the E-Team (E for evangelization). If you know many Catholics, evangelization is not a word they are overly comfortable with. Say it out loud and you are likely to find everyone looking at the floor or the ceiling hoping that if they don't make eye contact, you won't ask them to become evangelists! So it was with slight apprehension that the E-Team formed, its mission to create a stronger sense of community within the church in the hope that their love of Christ

that their love of Christ would spill out into the world with greater impact.

Love should not be something we schedule. Love should be a reflex.

One group, which still meets twice a month, is comprised of Dennis and Linda Hrcka, Andy and Mary Kay Kenney, Mike and Joanne Buckley, George and Krista Welte,

Bud and Beverly Price, Ken and Theresa Robbins and Tommy and Theresa Grant. Most of them are also involved in groups just for men or women.

The intention was simply to talk openly and freely about their faith. What they

thought would be an uncomfortable exercise turned into a spiritual game changer. Over time it made their faith more alive and empowered them to own their faith.

"If you want to know where you are in life, notice what your predominant thoughts are for the day. For me, being involved with these groups has caused me to think about my faith more on a daily basis and what I can do as a response to what Jesus did for us through his pascal mystery," says Dennis Hrcka.

Today, we can be concerned about offending someone or making them

feel uncomfortable, but really, that's our fear speaking louder than our love. We talk about the things we truly love, and if we're too scared to speak about our faith with those around us, we'll never let it surface in our daily lives.

"I didn't know any of the people, except in passing,

but now they are my best friends and confidants and people who I walk and live my faith with. A few years ago, I would have said that sounds hokey, but there is such power when you have people praying for you and with you," says Krista Welte.

The whole group agrees that suddenly they were not alone in their faith. They have each other and a real sense that God is present in their lives. Some of them had known each other since high school but had never talked about their faith or shared ideas. Being part of the faith group has changed their lives in immeasurable ways.

"It's not just changed our lives, we also work on the charitable works of mercy together to help others. Sometimes we take up a collection. We've done physical labor. Created dinners for the homeless shelter. We helped someone once with car repairs. We made a wheelchair ramp for someone who couldn't afford it. Bought a new hot water heater for the Pregnancy Resource Center. Being part of the group has made all those little acts of kindness fun and easier to do," says Linda Hrcka.

This new attitude about expressing their faith has not just affected their group. "A few nights ago a lot of us got together at the church to hold a prayer service for our children and grandchildren. There were about 70 people. No clergy, it was completely driven by the parishioners. I was awe inspired by everyone there that talked. People just called out prayers and it was beautiful. That would have never happened 10 years ago. The people involved are now not afraid to share," says Mike Buckley.

Creating community is about adding value to people's lives. It recognizes that people are not to be used but loved.

The group has become so much more than they could have ever anticipated. They have turned from strangers, to friends, to family. In the last 6 months two of the members, Joanne Buckley and Andy Kenney, have passed away and the Faith Group members have jumped in to support each other during a time of crisis and great loss.

Living your faith is not something that is only confined to the four walls of the church, like volunteering in the nursery or leading a Sunday school class. Instead, it's an everyday, outward expression of your love for God and what He is doing in your life. It's a choice that we must make, and it's one that impacts everyone around us.

God has blessed each of us with unique gifts that we can use to make the world a better place. Sometimes, we don't even realize we have those gifts, but they've been given to us for the purpose of living and sharing our faith.
